


Offshore petroleum wells in the GAB






Proposed Equinor petroleum well

Who are we?

- NOPSEMA is the independent regulator for offshore petroleum safety, well integrity and environmental management
- NOPSEMA is **not** responsible for:
 - Determining acreage
 - Awarding petroleum titles
 - Resource promotion
 - Championing economic opportunities



History in the GAB

- Petroleum activities have been occurring in the GAB for more than 50 years
- NOPSEMA does not currently have any plans under assessment for activities in the GAB
- NOPSEMA is aware that Equinor has been consulting in relation to proposed exploration drilling



Approvals

- Titleholders must consult "relevant persons" and demonstrate how "relevant issues" will be addressed
- NOPSEMA will consider all the relevant issues, facts, research and latest technologies in determining approval
- NOPSEMA rarely approves an environment plan without amendment
- If approval is granted, NOPSEMA will then regulate compliance with the relevant plan



Engagement

- We have an important role in advising proponents and the community about the regulatory regime
- We hold open days, workshops, information sessions and roadshows...
- Part of our role is to ensure the community understands the regulatory regime and how to participate, so they can have their say
- We continue to engage on an ongoing basis with the community and other stakeholders in South Australia





Australia's offshore petroleum industry


- A strong track record of safe, sustainable operations
 - Over 3,800 wells drilled offshore Australia since exploration began in the early 1960s.
 - The first Australian offshore exploration permit was granted in 1959 in Bass Strait.
 - Over the last 30 years an average 80 wells per year have been drilled.
 - 130 seismic surveys have also been conducted offshore South Australia – 148,841 km of 2D and 45,039 km² of 3D surveys.
- Independent, expert national regulator oversees all operations





Working with the fishing industry

- The oil and gas industry has a long track record of collaboration with the fishing industry:
 - Memorandum of Understanding signed in 2014 between APPEA and five commercial fishing and seafood industry associations across Australia.
 - Focusses on how we work together in relation to access and use of marine resources.
 - Seeks to improve cooperation, communication and consultation.
 - A Petroleum-Fishing Industry Roundtable supports delivery of MOU. This group most recently met in May 2018.
- Roundtable has agreed to work towards re-signing of the MOU in November 2019





The benefits could be significant

Local jobs, investment, taxes, royalties and community contributions

---Key findings — BASE CASE-----



1,361 FTE workers employed in South Australia during construction will be more people employed each year than there were employed at Holden's Elizabeth plant prior to its closure.



\$3.2 billion increase in Australia's real income per annum translates to an average 7.5% increase for every South Australian full-time worker.



\$5.8 billion in total output per annum equates to a **6% increase in the** size of the South Australian economy in 2016-17.



Average annual output of \$5.8 billion per annum would transform the Mining and Resources Industry into South Australia's 2nd largest industry.



At peak production, oil from the development would be easily South Australia's largest export, and be larger in value terms than the State's top five exports combined in 2016-17.



\$1.7 billion in Commonwealth and State taxation payments per annum from the development is equivalent to the cost of **three Adelaide Oval redevelopments every year**.

---Key findings — HIGH CASE -----



2,116 FTE workers employed in South Australia during construction will be equivalent to the number of people employed during peak construction of the Royal Adelaide Hospital.



\$12.6 billion increase in Australia's real income per annum translates to an average 29.5% increase for every South Australian full-time worker.



\$18.4 billion in real output per annum equates to an **18% increase in** the size of the **SA economy** in 2016-17.



Average annual output of \$18.4 billion per annum would increase the size of the Mining and Resources Industry five-fold, making it South Australia's largest industry.



At peak production, oil from the development would make it easily South Australia's most valuable export, and would be 25% larger than total exports from the State in 2016-17.



\$7.7 billion in Commonwealth and State taxation per annum is equivalent to the cost of three new Royal Adelaide Hospital developments every year.



So why is there a fight for the Bight?


Genuine concerns and a concentrated campaign seeking to scare and misinform



- Green & activist groups unconstrained by truth
- Have a stated aim to end fossil fuel use
- Ignore clear evidence of co-existence with fishing industry, local businesses and communities
- Grossly exaggerated claims of environmental risks
 - Both in terms of likelihood and impact of incidents
- Ignore track record of Australian industry, operating in Australian conditions and under Australian regulations
- Need for a balanced, sensible and honest discussion based on facts




